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Missing Type thank you

Thank you to all of the companies that got behind our 'Missing Type' campaign in August, removing your As and Os for a week to highlight the need for these precious blood groups. Your support was crucial in helping us to find 2,000 new donors in just 10 days. We were one of 21 countries taking part around the world. In New Zealand 48 companies signed up to take part in the campaign, with over 90 partners involved by the end of the week. We loved seeing your tweets, Facebook posts and signs with missing letters.

National Manager Marketing and Communications, Asuka Burge said she knew the campaign would be powerful, but even she was not prepared for the nationwide reaction.

"From iconic sports teams to world-leading businesses, we have had amazing support," says Burge. "Missing Type captured the nation's

imagination and it was fantastic to see everyday New Zealanders also get behind the cause and remove the A's and O's from their social media accounts and even help us to trend on Twitter.

More importantly, the campaign struck a chord with many people who realised it was more than just a clever hashtag. During the campaign, we had a 7,400% increase in online registrations. The new donors who signed up during the campaign have the potential to save and improve the lives of up to 6,000 people.

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Donating blood brings colleagues together

Dunedin-based firm Delta is an infrastructure specialist that invests in, designs, constructs, manages and maintains energy

and environmental infrastructure throughout the South Island. Fourtime donor and employee Hayden Wingfield tells us that "Delta is always looking to help out in the community. So when a colleague's family member passed away recently following an unexpected illness, we approached New Zealand Blood Service to see how we could help".

Lynn Rodeka, Donor Recruiter in Dunedin, went along to Delta to talk about how blood donation works, to explain how staff could help and to answer their queries and concerns. A week later, a team from Delta Utility Services headed to the Dunedin Donor Centre to donate. Over 20 staff signed up,

most of them first-time donors. "Doing it as a team also gave those who were a bit nervous the confidence to go for it," Hayden noticed.

As a large company with over 600 staff, Hayden says, colleagues don't always work with other teams, so donating blood brought together people who had never met before. He is now organising another donation day for his Delta teammates and hopes to get even more of his colleagues along next time.

"We have our certificate placed up in reception and I know the guys and girls that donated are proud" Hayden says.
